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The Love of God

The Word of the Lord: I John 4:8-9. *God is love. This is how God showed his love among us; He sent His one and only Son into the world that we might live through Him.*

On February 14th many people will celebrate Valentine's Day by showing their affections to a loved one. One of the benefits of a day like Valentine's Day is its encouragement to get our eyes off ourselves. We think of others on Valentine's Day. We connect with those we love. Our Savior is first among them.

The ultimate valentine, the greatest expression of love, was sent by God in Jesus Christ. Christ gave His life for us. Our sins were placed on the altar of Christ's cross and His self-sacrifice atoned for them. His blood pardons us sinners so that God completely blots out our transgressions and remembers them no more. The forgiveness of sin through Christ's sacrifice grants eternal life to all who have faith. That makes Jesus Christ worthy of our worship, commitment, and love. The religion of self must always give way to the only true religion, to surrendering one's life and love to Christ, who is head over all.

Dr. Martin Luther once said, "The love of God is revealed to Christians in personal pronouns." This is a deep and solid truth. All the way from the shepherd's Psalm with its "*He leads me*" to Paul's "*He loved me and gave Himself for me*" and "*He has made Him to be be sin for us.*" Here in God's inerrant word we find abundant proof of Luther's statement, "The love of God is revealed in personal pronouns."

True Christianity is faith in our God, who loved us so much that He gave His only Son to die for us. Note

those pronouns-- and then add another, they. Once a proper relationship of love has been established between Him and us, we will become more and more concerned about others. Luther was right: the love of God is revealed in personal pronouns--He and we and they. I pray that we would always keep these three in true perspective and apply them properly.

Missionary "Hector" Ottemoeller has often spoken of the first time he took the steamer up the river into the interior of Nigeria back in the late forties. En route he met the venerable missionaries and their wives who had labored for 30 years and more in the interior. He says he will never forget how as he spoke to them one could tell "their eyes had seen the love of God."

Somewhere I read about pilgrims who visit certain temples in Jerusalem. The incense is heavy. And as the pilgrims return to their homes or meet friends on the street, they can tell where these people have been.

I would hope others can tell where you have been, and where you are going? I would hope that others can see the Love of God in you.

The greatest expression of love is giving. Divine love led to the divine gift. "*God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life.*" (John 3:16). By the Spirit's power we grasp the depth of Christ's love for each and every one of us. It was love that prompted Christ to go to the cross to pay for our sin and the sin of the whole world.

This divine and heavenly valentine of love leads us to give to others. The greatest gift we have to share is the Gospel of Jesus Christ. And the amazing thing is that even if we give it away ten times each day, we still keep it. In fact, the more we give it away, the more we appreciate it and cherish it for ourselves. God promises

that everyone who shares Jesus Christ's love has been born of God and knows God.

Jesus calls us to be ready to share this divine valentine with others. He assures us of His redeeming love, His forgiving

presence, and the Holy Spirit's power in our lives to help us share the good news. By His grace may we be ready for His mission on earth.

The Message from Haiti: The Beginning of Birth Pains

We have seen pictures and heard news reports of the devastation and suffering in Haiti. The earthquake that struck that country has brought terrible destruction. But was it only a random act of nature or was it a message from God for all of us?

In Matthew 24 we are told of how Jesus had been talking with the disciples about the end times and his disciples asked Jesus: "When will this happen, and what will be the sign of your coming and of the end of the age?" Part of Jesus' response is included in Matthew 24:7-8: "Nation will rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of birth pains."

This recent earthquake and other disasters like it are reminders that the return of Christ and the final judgment are yet to come. Every time you hear about or witness some sort of "natural disaster," let it serve as a reminder from God that the final day of judgment is drawing close when our Lord will bring an end to this world and not one stone will be left upon another. The day will arrive where every individual will have to answer to the Lord for the life they have lived and the sins they have committed. The day of final judgment has not yet arrived for these are only the beginning of birth pains. For many people such a message brings even greater fear and pain than this current disaster in Haiti.

However, for the Christian the final return of Christ is something that can be a source of hope and joy. It is nothing we need to fear. We need not fear because Jesus has taken the judgment for us. He was judged worthy to die upon a cross in our place. Jesus suffered even the pains of hell in order that we may be taken to

heaven on that final day. Through faith in Christ our sins are forgiven and we are given the promise of a future in heaven where there will no longer be such terror and destruction faced by God's creation. When we are to give an account for our lives we can confess Christ and let His righteousness become our righteousness.

When you see and hear about natural disasters let them serve as a message from God for you. The Day of Judgment is drawing near. But let this message be a message of assurance because Jesus has faced the judgment against sin in your place. Certainly our hearts are grieved as we sympathize with the people of Haiti, pray for them, and extend a helping hand. However, even in the midst of the destruction God has a message of hope for us. The final day is drawing closer when Christ will return and because of Jesus you will be taken to heaven where such destruction and suffering will never again take place.

May God bless the people of Haiti as they work to rebuild their lives, but also may God use this as a message inviting them to trust in Him alone so that when Jesus returns they will not perish but will receive eternal life through faith in Him. Likewise, may God use this and all similar disasters that take place as a call to each one of us to realize that the final day is drawing closer and to trust in Jesus alone for our deliverance and our salvation. That day has not yet come. These are only the beginning of birth pains. Therefore look to Christ Jesus, trust in Him alone, and be certain that because of what He has done, you need not fear but can welcome the day of our Lord's return with eager anticipation. 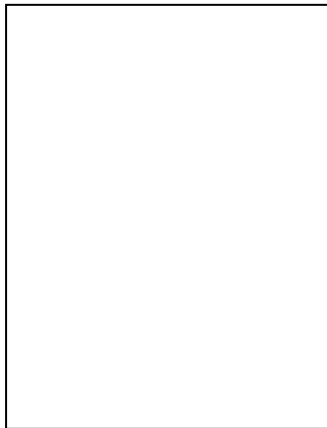

From Our Parish Nurse

We are in the throes of winter in Minnesota, how are you doing with the cold weather, ice and winds? Hopefully you are staying healthy, upbeat and able to be out and about. Please watch where you put your feet when walking outside, many of us have been walking like penguins to stay upright.

Here is some information on BONE HEALTH:

The primary goal is to prevent damage and pain with arthritis, osteoporosis and various joint problems. Several things will help and give you ammunition for the prevention of bone breakage. One is to get your Omega-3 fatty acids required in your daily diets. Today our diets have gotten out of balance when it comes to Omega-3 versus Omega-6 fatty acids. 3's are found primarily in fatty fish and some nuts and seeds, such as flaxseeds, almonds and walnuts. 6's are found in many vegetables, such as corn and corn oil. The benefits of 3's are well known as anti-inflammatory (fish oil supplements) what is less well known is the fact that your intake of fats can affect both bone formation and the rate at which bone is broken down. One study of 1,532 people between the ages of 45 and 90 found that the more Omega-3 fatty acids they consumed and the fewer Omega fatty-6 acids, the better their bone mineral density at the hip. Most of us cannot eat salmon twice a week (which would be ideal), but we can take 2 fish oil supplement capsules every day. I have talked a lot about supplementing our diets with Vitamin D. We have heard about D being the sunshine vitamin and that it helps your body absorb calcium and maintain enough calcium and phosphate in your blood so it doesn't get pulled out of the bone. It also gets credited with bone growth and breaking down and building up on bone. Low levels of vitamin D not only contribute to Osteoporosis, but also a condition called Osteomalacia, in which you feel an aching pain in your bone even as the bone weakens. Low vitamin D also causes muscle weakness which can lead to falls and fractures. Most experts recommend supplements of at least 1,000 IU's of Vitamin D daily. Especially women still need Calcium daily, even if you are taking medication for Osteoporosis. 1,200 mg. a day of Calcium is recommended. Take the calcium in the evening- if your supplement is in 600mg. Capsules then take 1 in the morning and 1 in the evening.



Smokers have lower bone density and higher risk of fractures. It is recommended that quitting smoking can assist calcium absorption and higher production of estradiol (hormone).

As is true with any chronic disease, exercise reduces your risk of Osteoporosis and Arthritis. By strengthening muscle and aiding in weight loss, exercise can reduce the strain on joints. Walking is the very best exercise, less strain on joints and ligaments. Remember, we have an exercise/walking program here at St. James. As I write, it is being formulated, so hopefully by the time you read this it is established. It is never too late to start, so come join in even if you cannot attend on a regular basis.

Some additional information:

Adding a handful of almonds to your bowl of fortified bran cereal can give you loads of energy and help lower your cholesterol too. Combining the antioxidants in almonds with the vitamin E in cereal more than doubles the heart disease protection you'd get from eating one or the other. This is according to research from Tufts University.

Try Greek Yogurt. It is rich in calcium and good for our bones, according to Dietitian, Kate Geagan. One serving supplies nearly 1/4 of daily calcium needs. Fat free Greek yogurt is also high in probiotics, cultures that can help ease irritable bowel syndrome, some experts say probiotics help boost immunity (definitely a plus now during the flu season). I found Greek yogurt at Cash Wise grocery store in St. Cloud. I had never heard of it before I read an article on it in a Health magazine I subscribe to.

Here is a cookie recipe that is touted to be America's Healthiest Cookie: You be the judge!

Chocolate Chunk and Walnut Oatmeal Cookies

Melt 6 Tbsps. Unsalted butter in microwave or small saucepan. Remove from heat, add 3/4 cup packed light brown sugar, stir until smooth.

Combine 1/3 cup flour, 1/3 cup whole wheat flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ tsp. Baking soda and $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups Old-fashioned oats and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. Salt. Combine butter mixture with the dry ingredients. Add 1 egg, lightly beaten. Add 1 tsp. Vanilla. Fold in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup coarsely chopped walnuts and 3 oz. coarsely chopped bittersweet chocolate. Mix well, spoon by tablespoonfuls onto baking sheets. Bake for 12 minutes or until tops are dry to the touch. Makes about 32 cookies.

I haven't tried these yet, but I think I might use semi-sweet chocolate instead of the bitter-sweet. If you make them, let me know what you think.

I'm still doing Cholesterol checks and blood pressure checks in the office, let me know when I can do these for you.

Remember your loved ones on Valentine's Day. Dark chocolate is healthy for you, give some away and you will feel the love abound.

Stewardship

On February 17th we will join Christians around the world in observing the season of Lent. Lent is a deeply spiritual time as we reflect on the tremendous love and sacrifice of Jesus for us so that we might have forgiveness of sins, life and salvation. The price of our redemption was overwhelming. As Dr. Martin Luther said in explaining the second article of the Apostles Creed "*Jesus, my Lord, has redeemed me a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death.*" As Jesus Himself said, "*Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends.*" (John 15:13 NIV)

Dr. Luther went on with his explanation to state that Jesus made this supreme sacrifice "*so that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true!*"

In Jesus we have been redeemed from all sins, including the sin of selfishly wanting to use all of God's blessings for our own needs and wants rather than using them to His glory and the welfare of our neighbor. Selfishness is not part of good stewardship! Here is a definition of good and godly stewardship: "*God's redeemed stewards, in cooperation with and encouragement from fellow redeemed stewards, freely and joyfully manage all of life and life's resources for God's purposes.*"

Lent provides us with an excellent opportunity to reflect on what is really important and worth spending our lives and resources on. During this 2010 season of Lent may God's Holy Spirit help us to understand that God wants to use us as instruments in His hands to touch the lives of others in ways that make an eternal difference. As we are led to accept this truth we will better understand what it means to use our time, our skills and talents, and our financial resources in loving and sacrificial ways.

What a time of spiritual growth the season of Lent can be for us as we strive to spend our lives and resources on things that really matter and last beyond our lifetimes. God's redeemed stewards want to make this world a better place because we have been here. May the love and sacrifice of Jesus so impress us that we will want to reach out in loving and sacrificial ways.

A Kleva Finds Christ

Walking along the dirt road of Tanna Island, Vanuatu, past small trade stores, past the open market bustling beneath the shade of a large tree, past the wharf where small cargo ships unload rice, canned fish, flour and fuel, Jimmy happened to meet Pastor Joshua.

Jimmy had heard Scripture on a MegaVoice digital audio player and was intrigued. As a lifelong *kleva*, he practiced magic, manipulating spirits' power. Talking to Pastor Joshua, Jimmy agreed to listen to John's Gospel, chapter 1. Impressed, he begged to keep the device.

Eventually Jimmy returned, saying the MegaVoice talk had really helped him. He was so struck by the Scriptures that he told others, "This MegaVoice tells the truth. I'm going to follow what it says."

Pastor Joshua talked to Jimmy more about God's Word and Jesus. Jimmy then asked him to pray that the spirit of the *kleva* would leave him, and he accepted Jesus as his Savior.

With the MegaVoice in hand, Jimmy went to a nearby *nakamal*, where people drink *kava*, a mildly sedating beverage. He found some men doing magic on a sick man and told them, "The time (for old ways) is past. It's the time of Jesus now." The men doing the magic were touched and went to church the next Sunday. Then Jimmy invited the pastor to go to his sacred places and pray against the spirits.

Such is the power of Jesus the Messiah—working through MegaVoice technology—who transformed a *kleva*, granting him to become a child of God.
